#### MINUTES Board of Directors May 17, 2022

#### SUBJECT TO APPROVAL

1. The meeting was called to order with proper social distancing among everyone and with accommodation for the public through the use of Zoom Meetings at 9:00 A.M. Board President Pete Neal called the meeting to order and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

#### 2. **PUBLIC APPEARANCES/COMMENT -** None

#### 3. CONSENT ITEMS

Mr. McKinney made a motion to approve Consent Items 3.1 and 3.2. Mr. Clemens seconded; motion passed 4-0 (AYES: Clemens, Dashner, Neal, McKinney; Absent: Barr).

#### 4. COMMITTEE REPORTS

#### 4.1. <u>Finance Committee (Directors Dashner & Barr)</u>

Chief Johnson reported the Finance Committee had met and reviewed finances including the El Dorado Savings Bank reconciliation. He estimated that the District would carry over nearly \$4 million to the upcoming fiscal year and noted the very good April transport revenue amount of \$125,000 received.

4.2. <u>Personnel/Safety Committee (Directors Dashner & McKinney)</u> Chief Johnson reported the committee members had reviewed the draft MOU and that he had handed out a corrected copy for the Board review (correction different

than the one in the Board's Packet). He noted a other items discussed was the safety equipment provided which Glen Verkerk had been present to give better detail and that Rodney Hendrix was still recruiting for the open position.	
Fire Prevention Committee (Directors Clemens & Neal) Chief Johnson reported the committee had not met this month yet Joan Lark had processed a few citations. He noted that today closed the time period for private yard waste burning although the Big Trees State Park live burn continued.	
<u>Apparatus/Equipment Committee (Directors McKinney &amp; Neal)</u> Battalion Chief Aaron Downing reported the new engine would be coming to the District in June. He gave additional information about the pre-build status of the recently ordered ambulance along with the maintenance status of District vehicles.	

#### 5. <u>Scheduled Items</u>

- 5.1. Calaveras Local Agency Formation Commission: <u>Nomination Ballot for Calaveras LAFCO Special District Member - 2022</u> Mr. Dashner reported that he would like the position if no other District Board member was interested and noted the meetings were the third Monday of every other month. Mr. Clemens made a motion to have Jon Dashner run for the position on LAFCO. Mr. McKinney seconded; motion passed 4-0 (AYES: Clemens, Dashner, Neal, McKinney; Absent: Barr).
- 5.2. <u>EPFD Personal Safety Equipment Discussion</u> Chief Johnson noted the highlighted items on the list under Structure and Wildland on the Personal Equipment List were items to be available on the District's shelves. The items for Structure fire response were headlamp, radio holder, hand tool, door wedges, flashlights, and hose straps. The items for Wildland fire response were headlamp, chest harness, water bottles, hydration bladder, and Code 5 bag. Chief Johnson reported that the other two highlighted items, winter coat and extrication coat, were to be researched further by District personnel.
- 5.3. <u>Pacific Gas and Electric Company: Enhanced Powerline Safety Settings (EPSS)</u> Chief Johnson reported that PG&E seemed to want to be more sensitive to anticipate electrical issues before they become larger issues.
- 5.4. <u>Calaveras Auditor-Controller: FY 2022-23 Preliminary Budget</u> Chief Johnson reported that, following the Board approval of the COLA, District staff put together the proposed Preliminary Budget for Board approval including the COLA and a healthy capital outlay although not all anticipated revenue increases were yet known. Mr. Dashner made a motion to accept the Preliminary Budget for fiscal year 2022-23 as presented. Mr. McKinney seconded; motion passed 4-0 (AYES: Clemens, Dashner, Neal, McKinney; Absent: Barr).

#### 5.5. EPFD Fiscal Year 2022-23 Five-Year Capital Outlay

Chief Johnson reported that the District had paid off the ambulance loan with its IGT receipts this fiscal year. He noted a few of the items included in the Capital Outlay plan for the upcoming fiscal year which also had been included in the Preliminary Budget. Mr. McKinney made a motion to approve the 5-year Capital Outlay as presented. Mr. Clemens seconded; motion passed 4-0 (AYES: Clemens, Dashner, Neal, McKinney; Absent: Barr).

#### 5.6. EPFD Fiscal Year 2022-23 Personnel Pay Schedule

Chief Johnson noted that the Pay Schedule presented for Board review included the upper portion as negotiated with the Union which had reduced each level to six steps. Similarly, staff had set the steps to be only six for each level for the administrative personnel. After some discussion, Mr. Clemens made a motion to accept the Pay Schedule for 2022-23 as presented. Mr. Dashner seconded; motion passed 4-0 (AYES: Clemens, Dashner, Neal, McKinney; Absent: Barr).

#### 5.7. EPFD Longevity Pay Request for Cheryl Howard

Chief Johnson briefly reviewed the request he had submitted for Cheryl Howard to receive 12% Longevity Pay which is in parity with those who are of similar salary level within the Local #3581 ranks. He added that she had been with the District for over 30 years. Mr. McKinney made a motion to approve the Longevity Pay for Cheryl Howard as presented. Mr. Dashner seconded; motion passed 4-0 (AYES: Clemens, Dashner, Neal, McKinney; Absent: Barr).

#### 5.8. <u>Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) Between EPFD and EPFF Local #3581</u> Chief Johnson reported that a letter had been received from Ebbetts Pass Fire Fighters Local #3581 reporting that its members had met on May 14, 2022, and approved the MOU. Mr. Dashner made a motion to accept the Memorandum of Understanding between Ebbetts Pass Fire District and Ebbetts Pass Firefighter's Local #3581. Mr. McKinney seconded; motion passed 4-0 (AYES: Clemens, Dashner, Neal, McKinney; Absent: Barr).

#### 6. **Reports**

6.1. <u>Administrative Report</u>

Chief Johnson reported that the controlled burn at Big Trees State Park was continuing along with a USFS-controlled burn over near Strawberry on the Tuolumne County side of the river. He noted that the marquis sign was in place for the season and that Battalion Chief Matt O'Donnell was currently teaching a high angle course.

#### 6.2. <u>Legislative Report</u>

Chief Johnson reported the mail-in ballots were out for the Board of Supervisors position. He added that Dana Nichols would be present at the June regular meeting of the EPFD Board with information on the citizen's sales tax initiative.

#### 6.3. Administrative - EMS

Chief Johnson reported that the Mountain-Valley EMS Agency transition to an agency without Stanislaus County continued with establishment of an office in Copperopolis and the movement of its treasury to Calaveras County.

This email is intended for all eligible providers as defined in § 14105.945(a)(1) of the Welfare and Institutions Code that are interested in participating in the Public Provider Ground Emergency Medical Transportation (PP-GEMT) Intergovernmental Transfer (IGT) Program. In accordance with Assembly Bill (AB) 1705 (Chapter 544, Statutes of 2019), this program is set to **Jaunch January 1, 2023**.

Once the PP-GEMT IGT Program is implemented public providers will no longer be included in the GEMT Quality Assurance Fee (QAF) program and the GEMT Certified Public Expenditure (CPE) program will cease to operate. Instead, public providers will receive increased reimbursement through an add-on payment under the PP-GEMT IGT program. The nonfederal share cost of implementing the PP-GEMT IGT program will be supported by intergovernmental transfers of funds by participating providers. Implementation of the PP-GEMT IGT Program may cease if there are insufficient nonfederal share funds to support implementation of the program. If the PP-GEMT IGT program ceased to operate, public providers would return to the status quo (i.e., be included in the GEMT QAF program and claim FFS reimbursement through the GEMT CPE program).

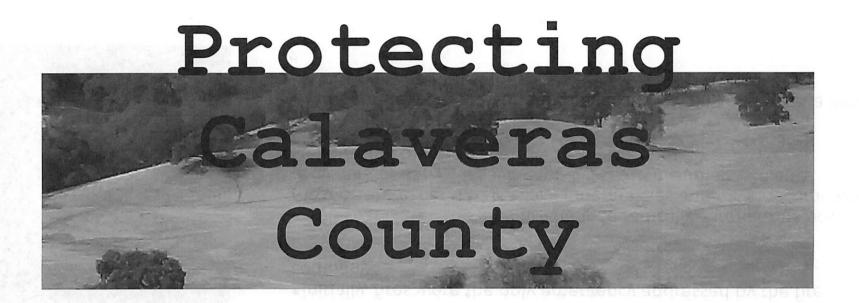

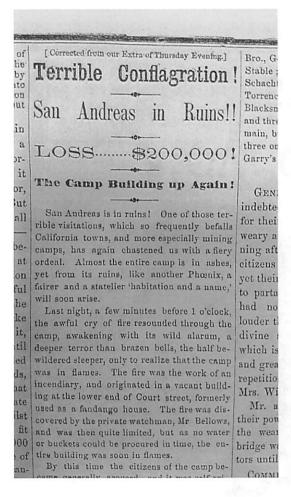

# How can we keep our fire stations staffed?



### Volunteer firefighters were once the people who owned the town

• Business owners in San Andreas formed a volunteer fire company in 1858 after flames destroyed most of the town. Volunteers paid dues to be members.

 Initially, fires were the only emergency addressed by the fire company

• 160 years later, the job has changed radically. Firefighters now most often respond to medical emergencies and have become key providers of early, lifesaving medical care including CPR and stabilization of injuries.

• Firefighters must now undergo rigorous training and meet a long list of governmental standards.



# Who volunteers now? How can they afford to do it?

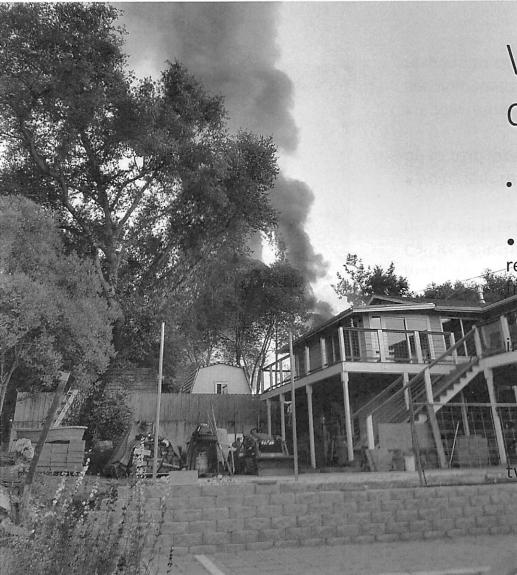
• Young people seeking training. Some can afford to volunteer because they still live at home.

• Once they are fully trained, many fire districts pay small stipends if the volunteers serve 24-hour shifts at the station. However this is not a living wage.

• Volunteers who are fully trained can sometimes temporarily earn as much as \$30 an hour if they serve on strike teams on fires run by CalFire. But this is like a jackpot, the volunteers never know when or how long these assignments will be.

• Volunteer turnover is high. Once they have experience, many moved on to paid jobs so they can start a family and earn a living.

• A few retirees and middle age adults also volunteer. But most middleage volunteers have to work and so have limits on their ability to respond to calls.



# What happens when I dial 911?

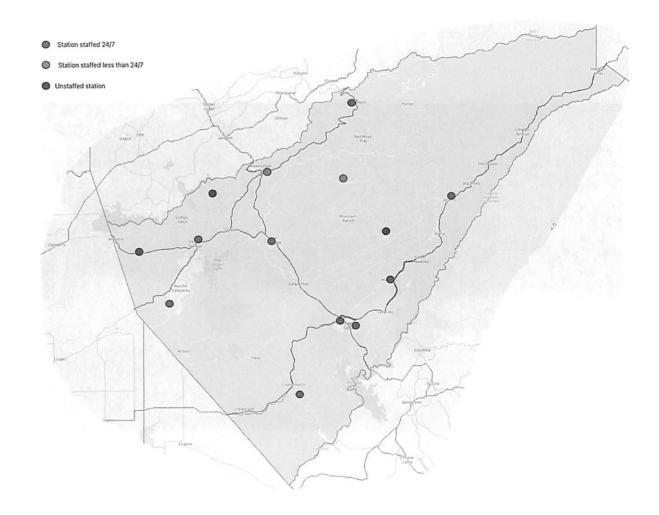
- Dispatchers send the nearest available resources.
- In the case of structure fires, like this one, the response includes fire engines and other units om a number of different agencies.

One fire engine is not enough to handle a fullyvolved structure fire. Most fire districts only have ne engine crew, if that, on duty at any given time. hus mutual aid is essential.

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# Engine crew sizes vary

• Four is considered standard, both due to 2-in-2 out rule and for intensive medical events like CPR.

• Three is minimum to get paid for state wildfire events

• Many Calaveras districts have only one or two on the engine, at least for initial dispatch.



Many fire districts in Calaveras County lack adequate revenue, depend on strike team pay



• Several Districts have less money than it takes to keep a bare bones operation.

• Almost all districts subsidize their operation by sending engines out on strike teams. But the money is not reliable.

• Districts have been draining down their reserves to maintain operations.

• Firefighters leave for other jobs because they can't live on volunteer pay.



# How to assure response time and impact in Calaveras Count

- Have at least two firefighters on duty 24/7 in all fire districts
- Reopen and staff now-closed stations in geographically large districts that need them to assure fast response
- Move closer to 4-person engine staffing where possible. This will likely be a combination of paid and volunteer firefighters.
- Eliminate dependence on strike team earnings

### A 1-cent sales tax could stabilize Calaveras Fire protection

• a 1-cent sales tax would yield about \$4 million per year, or around \$400,000 per fire agency in Calaveras County.

• Every fire district in Calaveras County could get enough revenue to keep a couple paid firefighters on duty, 24/7 and, possibly also expand volunteer stipends and training.

 Pay would be in the \$15/hour range, close to minimum wage, not competitive with city fire departments.

• Revenue should be divided in a way that accounts both for basic staffing needs and the variation in population, call volume and geographic area of the districts.

## Sales tax in California

 Right now, Calaveras County residents pay higher sales tax when they visit other parts of the state.

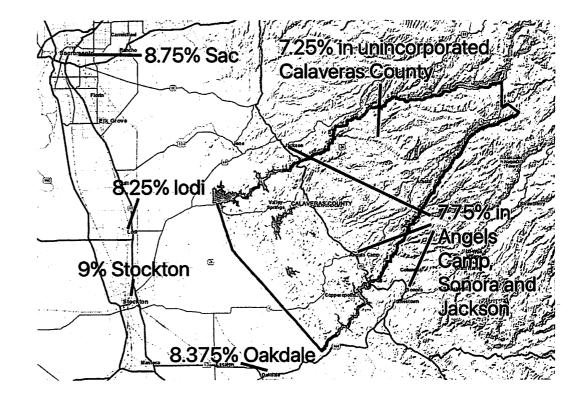
• But visitors to Calaveras County pay less when they come here, even though our fire agencies come to their aid for emergencies.



### Sales tax in the region

• If voters approve a 1 cent sales tax, the rate would go to 8.25% in unincorporated Calaveras County

• The rate would increase to 8.75% in Angels Camp



# Voter Approval required

• If voters circulate a petition to get a sales tax measure on the ballot, then it will require a simple majority, 50% plus one, to pass.

• If Fire agencies or county government put it on the ballot, it requires a 2/3 plus one supermajority, making passage less likely.

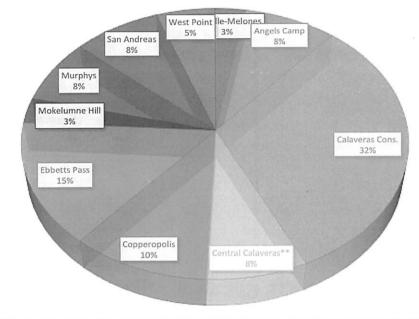

WEBSITE: www.truckeefire.org/fire-ban As we've all seen, the fire danger in California has continued to increase and the Truckee area is no exception. California has seen 9 of the 20 most destructive fires in California's recorded history in the last 5 years!

The build-up of dry fuels, a significant drought and more people moving to and visiting the wildland urban interface have led to this extreme fire danger that threatens our community. **Many of the visitors to our region don't understand the danger, adding to the risk of an escaped campfire.** 

Each year the Fire District responds to unattended or improperly extinguished residential campfires that escape the fire ring and start a wildfire. If this happens on a windy day a wildfire could be devastating to our community. **That is why the Truckee Fire Protection District is implementing a District-wide ordinance to ban backyard type campfires during fire season**.

> EFFECTIVE THIS FIRE SEASON (Starting in June)

- No wood or charcoal fires
- Report illegal fires by calling 911
- Fire season usually runs from June -November

\***PLEASE NOTE** - The fire ban does not include gas appliances like gas BBQ's, gas fire pits, pellet burning devices. Campgrounds and Day-use picnic areas are exempt.

## FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS (FAQ)

#### What is banned?

Residential campfires/bonfires that burn anything other than gas and BBQ's that burn solid fuel like charcoal briquettes, wood or lump charcoal including the Big Green Egg type.

#### What is allowed?

Gas campfires, gas portable fire pits, gas BBQ's, pellet burning devices.

#### Who is exempt?

Designated campgrounds and day-use picnic areas, private campgrounds and community picnic areas with a valid permit, outdoor special event/commercial cooking operations with a valid permit.

## Will the ban start when CalFire announces fire season for the entire state?

Yes, typically starting in June and ending after we get significant moisture, usually in November.

#### Can people use a briquette fuel-based smoker?

No, the issue being that there are briquettes being used and there still exists a risk of improper disposal of charcoal remnants.

#### Can people use a wood pellet fuel-based BBQ/smoker?

Yes, pellet burning devices are well contained and fully consumed to ash with no super-heated particles remaining that could start a fire after disposal.

#### Can people add wood shavings, like apple wood and other types you can buy for added flavoring, to a smoker or gas grill?

No, the addition of wood shavings will present a similar risk of incomplete combustion and improper disposal that can start a wildfire.

## Would the district consider issuing briquette BBQ permits to individual residents?

No, with over 15,000 residential structures in the district, there is no logistical/financial way we could inspect, issue, or enforce permits of that magnitude.

# Will permits be issued for picnic areas and special events/commercial cooking operations that use briquette/wood BBQ's?

Yes, these operations will be inspected for safe practices and issued a permit with specific operating guidelines.

#### **BEFORE THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE TRUCKEE FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT OF NEVADA COUNTY**

#### **ORDINANCE 04-2019**

#### AN ORDINANCE SETTING FORTH THE REQUIREMENTS AND/OR RESTRICTIONS PERTAINING TO BANNING OPEN BURNING, RECREATIONAL FIRES AND CHARCOAL BBQ'S DURING HIGH FIRE CONDITIONS AND PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT OPTIONS AND PENALTIES

WHEREAS, Truckee Fire Protection District is a Fire Protection District organized and existing pursuant to Health and Safety Code Sections 13800 ("TFPD") and following., and

WHERAS, In the Truckee Fire Protection District, wildfire threatens people, forests, homes, structures and recreation and the area is identified by Cal Fire as a Very High Fire Severity Zone, and

WHERAS, there is an increased threat of wildfire when open burning, recreational fires and charcoal BBQ's are allowed during high fire hazard conditions, and

WHERAS, improperly extinguished recreational fires have the potential to escape the confines of their fire ring and threaten to, and have in the past spread to nearby wildland and structures, and

WHERAS, improperly disposed of charcoal BBQ ashes have the potential to ignite combustible material and threaten to, and have spread to nearby wildland and structures, and

WHERAS, the large visitor population in the District is not familiar that the District experiences elevated wildland fire danger and is designated a Very High Fire Severity Zone by the State of California, and

WHEREAS, by banning open burning, recreational fires and charcoal BBQ's during high fire hazard conditions (Wildland Fire Season), the threat of wildfire can be reduced.

#### NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE TRUCKEE FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT OF NEVADA COUNTY AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. All of the above recitals are true and correct.
- 2. The District Board hereby rescinds Ordinance 03-2019 "Setting Forth the Requirements and/or Restrictions Pertaining to Banning Open Burning and Recreational Fires During High Fire Conditions and Providing for Enforcement Options and Penalties", effective when this ordinance takes effect.
- 3. Open Burning, Camp Fires, Bonfires, Portable Outdoor Fireplaces, Charcoal Barbeques,

Truckee Fire Protection District ORDINANCE 04-2019 Ceremonial Fires and Recreational Fires as stated in the 2016 California Fire Code within the District's jurisdiction, shall be prohibited when atmospheric conditions or other local circumstances make such fires hazardous including when, in the judgment of the Fire Chief or their designee, the menace of destruction by wildfire to life, improved property, or natural resources is due to factors that may cause the rapid spread of wildfire such as; high winds, low fuel moistures, fire weather, the issuance of red flag warnings, severe threat of wildland fire, or the issuance of the fire restriction "suspending burning" on lands within or adjacent to the TFPD by the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CalFire) or by the United States Forest Service (USFS).

#### **EXEMPTIONS:**

- a. UL or ASMI listed manufactured GAS (LPG or NG) outdoor flame devices, such as: Gas BBQ's or Gas Fire-pits that comply with the Fire Code.
- b. Campfires and Charcoal BBQ's in designated campgrounds and/or picnic areas located on State or Federal lands.
- c. Campfires and Charcoal BBQ's in a designated campgrounds and/or picnic area on other public or private lands, with additional restrictions as determined by TFPD staff.
- d. Charcoal BBQ's for a commercial restaurant, catering operation or special event, with additional restrictions as determined by TFPD staff.
- 4. Open Burning (as described in section 2) will be prohibited on issuance of the fire restriction "suspending burning" on lands within or adjacent to the Fire District by the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CalFire) or by the United States Forest Service (USFS). This is often referred to as the "burn ban" and "wildland fire season" which generally runs from June to November when wildland fires can burn out of control, but will vary each year depending on past, current and forecast conditions.
- 5. Subject to Sections 2 & 3 of this Ordinance, failure to comply may be punishable as a misdemeanor, and a possible fine of \$1000.00 per day of violation and/or up to 90 days in jail.
- 6. The Fire Chief can delay the start of, or the end of the ban on open burning based on local fire conditions.
- 7. If any section, sub-section, paragraph, clause or word of the Ordinance is determined in a final ruling by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, such finding shall not invalidate any other section, sub-section, paragraph, clause or word of this Ordinance, which shall remain in effect.
- 8. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force 30 days from its passage, until it is amended, suspended, and/or rescinded by the Board of Directors. Before the expiration of 15 days after its passage, the Ordinance shall be published once in the *Sierra Sun*, a newspaper of general circulation within the jurisdiction of TFPD.

Glad to help on this. About 4 or 5 years ago we noticed that our escaped campfires had gone from around 5 to around 15 a year so wanted to do something. We polled the community on an informal facebook poll and 75% of 200 respondents said they would support a campfire and charcoal ban during fire season. The Board agreed and put this ordnance in place. <u>https://www.truckeefire.org/fire-ban-faq</u>

We wanted to tie it to some independent decider so we tied it to the local Cal Fire burn ban. It doesn't always align perfectly since the unit has a low elevation west side portion that drives the ban maybe earlier than we would need it but we didn't want to be in a position of deciding when fire season starts and ends. It seems to work fine. Cal Fire banned burning in our unit last week which triggered our campfire ban. We don't change it if the weather changes, we believe consistent season long ban is important for consistency and messaging.

As you can imagine we got some pushback initially from locals who said it was a way of life but they also seem to understand that we are reacting to the lowest common denominator which is often visitors (and locals) that don't put their fires out and it reignites the following day. The more controversial part is the charcoal ban. In our district over the 5 years we looked at we had 8 fires started by improperly disposed of charcoal (dumped in the backyard). But it seems we had some complaints about this.

The other issue is we ban fires and charcoal but the State and Fed campgrounds in our district allow it and won't follow our ordinance. This drives people crazy. We just tell them we don't have authority. he fact is we have never had a local fire from a campground campfire because of the quality of the ring, low fuel and patrolled nature - so not our biggest risk.

Lastly, the local retailers are still selling wood and charcoal and this also drive some people crazy. Our board didn't want to mess with controlling commerce and it was an unintended consequence. They are big corporate stores that just get delivery's and don't make local decisions. The way we have dealt with it is we provide signs explaining the ban that they all willingly post. People can still use the charcoal and wood at the campgrounds.

We tell people to either talk to their neighbor when the burn or call 911. Most just call 911. We went on about 100 complaint calls last year but 50% were legal gas fires or BBQs, so good education opportunity. We educate and extinguish and have not taken any legal action to date, no time for that and people cooperate. In a few cases we involved local LE to back us up but rare.

All the local fire districts followed suit and copied the ordinance so we can now say it is "regional" ban, which is nice too.

We considered this concept of providing a certification program maybe on line with a test to allow permitted fires. The problem is that the neighbor sees the neighbor having a fire so they have their own and nobody knows who's permitted and who is not. We just don't believe that that is a practical solution. However, we do permit commercial operations. Say a restaurant wants to BBQ. We come out and make sure they have a proper disposal method, daily - good clearances etc. and provide them a permit. Also, for special events, say a wedding caterer wants to BBQ, we will do the same. We allow Gas BBQs and Campfires so there is some fire allowed. As you know when people turn those appliance off they cool quickly and don't create the problem. People argue "I am at the campfire and I can manage it with my hose" and we have to explain that the fires are usually not a problem while you are having the fire, its the next day when you aren't here and the wind picks up, RH drops etc.

In summary the district, board, neighboring FDs and the silent majority are really happy and supportive of this ban, and it works. Since its been in place over the last three years I think we have had only 3 escaped campfire fires and no BBQ's.

Purpose and Scope

The purpose of this policy is to define guidelines for the accrual and use of Compensatory Time Off.

01. Employees hired under the current (2006) version of the Memorandum of Understanding between the Ebbetts Pass Fire Protection District and Ebbetts Pass Firefighter's Local #3581 may elect to accrue and maintain a maximum of 240 hours of Compensatory Time Off in lieu of cash payment for overtime hours worked.

Employees hired after July 1, 2008, may elect to accrue and maintain a maximum 96 hours of CTO.

- 02. Administrative employees who meet the FLSA exemption from overtime criteria are not allowed to accrue CTO.
- 03. For record keeping purposes, CTO hours represent hours previously earned at 1.5T which have been converted to straight time.
- 04. Effective January 1, 2007, under the guidelines outlined under Policy No. 6110.06. below, employees assigned to shift work are allowed the utilize a maximum of 240 hours (10-24 hour shifts) of CTO per calendar year and must be taken in minimum 12-hour blocks of time.
- 05. Effective January 1, 2006, under the guidelines outlined in Policy No. 6110.06. below, employees assigned to a 40-hour per week work schedule are allowed to utilize 80 hours (8-8 hour days) of CTO per calendar year and must be taken in minimum 8-hour blocks of time.
- 06. Requests for scheduled shift vacancy including CTO shall be submitted at least 14 days in advance. Requests shall be approved by the Fire Chief with reasonable regard for the desires of the employee insofar as they are consistent with the needs of the District. Standard approval shall require back-fill employees to sign-up for the shifts made vacant by the CTO request.
- 0607. Employees may utilize CTO to take time off from work for any reason, however, the Fire Chief or his/her designee shall have full discretion to establish guidelines and procedures for processing and authorizing employee request for utilization of CTO and may deny requests to utilize CTO if established guidelines are not met or followed. Such guidelines Policy 6110 Page 1 of 2

and procedures may included, but are not necessarily limited to:

•CTO request notification time frames: 21-14 days

- •Established procedures for filling shift vacancies
- •Availability of qualified relief
- •Maintenance and affect on minimum staffing levels
- •The absence of the employee does not cause a hardship on the District
- 07. Except upon termination of employment or retirement, cash payments for time accrued as CTO shall not be allowed without approval of the Board.
- 08. Upon request, and with the approval of the Fire Chief or his/her designee, an employee may be allowed to utilize more than 240 hours per year for reasons having to do with family emergencies or special circumstances.
- 09. Without District approval, accrued CTO time may not be transferred (donated) from one employee to another employee.

01. Each permanent full-time employee shall be entitled to an annual paid vacation. No employee shall be entitled to utilize accrued vacation time until he/she has been in District service for at least 12 months.

01.1. The Board of Directors authorizes the Fire Chief the discretion to waive the required 12 months of service time for employees who have become permanent full-time and who were previously temporary part-time, temporary full-time or permanent part-time.

- 02. With sufficient notification and so long as it does not place a burden on District operations, personnel shall be allowed to take vacation time in any increments of time.
- 03. Requests for vacation scheduled shift vacancy including vacation shall be submitted at least 21-14 days in advance. Requests shall be approved by the Fire Chief with reasonable regard for the desires of the employee insofar as they are consistent with the needs of the District. Standard approval shall require back-fill employees to sign-up for the shifts made vacant by the vacation request.
- 04. Requests for vacation submitted between January 1 and January 31 of each calendar year shall be honored by seniority.

06. Paid vacation time for 24-hour shift personnel shall accrue as follows:

Upon hire and less than 5 years of service: 9.33 hours/month (112 hours/year) (Cap 224) Begin at 5 years of service and less than 10 years of service: 14.0 hours/month (168 hours/year) (Cap 336) Begin at 10 years of service and less than 15 years of service: 18.67 hours/month (224 hours/year) (Cap 448) Begin at 15 years of service: 20 hours/month (240 hours/year) (Cap 480)

07. Paid vacation time for 8-hour-per-day personnel shall accrue monthly at a rate equal to:

Upon hire and less than 5 years of service: 10 working days per year (Cap 160) Begin at 5 years of service and less than 10 years of service: 15 working days per year (Cap 240) Begin at 10 years of service and less than 15 years of service: 20 working days per year (Cap 320) Begin at 15 years of service: 22 working days per year (Cap 352)

08. Employees may not accrue more than two years of vacation time based upon their respective time in service.

Policy 6130 - Page 1 of 2

08.1. Employees shall be allowed a 30-day "grace" period to schedule vacation upon reaching their designated vacation cap.

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- 09. Upon separation from service, retirement, or death, employees, and in the case of death the spouse of the employee, shall be paid for 100% of unused vacation time at the current hourly rate for their rank and step.
- 10. Cash payments for accrued vacation time, with the exception of separation from service, retirement or death, shall not be allowed.

On May 5, 2022, the SDRMA Board of Directors approved tentative Bylaw revisions in draft form and authorized staff to send the proposed Bylaw revisions to members for review and comment. Current Bylaws require that members receive a draft of the proposed Bylaw revisions at least 30 days before final approval by the SDRMA Board of Directors. The Board will take final action on the revised Bylaws at the next regular board meeting at 3:00 p.m. on June 22, 2022, in Sacramento, California at the SDRMA administration building.

Regarding the Bylaw revisions, the proposed amendments identified ambiguous language contained in Article 5, Joint Protection Programs. Provided below for your review is the excerpt from the SDRMA Bylaws with the "redlined" version of the Bylaws showing proposed revisions.

#### ARTICLE V JOINT PROTECTION PROGRAMS

1. Implementation of Joint Protection Programs

The Board of Directors may, at any time, offer such Programs as it may deem desirable. Such Program or Programs shall be offered on such terms and conditions as the Board of Directors may determine. Members must participate in at least one Joint Protection Program, but participation in any additional Programs or plans will be optional. Those Programs currently include: Property/Liability, Workers' Compensation, Health Benefits and various optional ancillary coverages. The Board of Directors shall establish the amount of Contributions, Estimated Contributions and Assessments, determine the amount of loss reserves, provide for the handling of claims, determine both the type and amount of insurance and/or reinsurance, if any, to be purchased, and otherwise establish the policies and procedures necessary to provide a particular Program for Members. As soon as feasible after development of the details of a Program, the specific rules and regulations for the implementation of such Program shall be adopted by the Board, which shall cause them to be set forth in written form in a <u>policy-Memorandum of Coverage document</u> and procedures Claims mManual prepared by the Authority for the Members.

Method of Calculating Contributions
 The Board of Directors shall establish the method of calculating contributions for Members
 in each Program or plan annually.
